Ancient or modern?

Cycladic figurines, among the earliest representations of the human figure, impress us today with their simple and timeless presence. Nevertheless, until the mid-20th century, the archaeologists who unearthed them as well as the general public regarded them as "inelegant", "inartistic", "primitive", since the works of art of classical times, and especially of the 5th century BC, such as Aphrodite of Milos, Hermes of Praxiteles, etc., were the ultimate standard for these people.

From the late 19th century, and especially at the beginning of the 20th century, renowned European artists, sculptors and painters, such as Brancusi, Matisse, Moore, Coper, Hepworth, Picasso, Giacometti, Modigliani and others, started encountering Cycladic figurines in museums and collections. The nearly flat marble figures, with their simplicity and symmetrical proportions, captivated and ignited the imagination of these artists. Through their artworks, they invite us to view the Cycladic figurines from a fresh perspective, inviting us to imagine a bridge that spans across the centuries.

With these words, Giacometti addressed his audience who admired the simplicity of the forms in his works.

Look around you, inside the house, through the window, in the garden or even during your walk and find objects that remind you of a figure in the same simple way.

You can always carry a sketchbook with you, like artists do, and sketch it. Or you can even take a photo of it.
